TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

October 24-25, 2024 | Kananaskis

This program took place in Kananaskis, Mînî Thnî, Mînî Hrpa & Chuwapchipchiyan Kudi Bi; on land cared for by the First Nations of Treaty 7 and the Metis people of the Battle River Territory since time immemorial.

The discussions and activities throughout the program were led primarily by Indigenous community members from the Stoney Nakoda Nation - we extend our utmost gratitude to Margaret Rider, Daryl Kootenay, Brooklyn McWilliams - Fraser, Gage Beaver and Travis Rider who graciously share their time, experience and perspectives.

In the spirit of reconciliation and with reciprocity for the traumas brought by the Indian Act and Residential Schools, Inside Education respectfully acknowledges Indigenous Peoples and their deep connections to the land. Inside Education strives to listen and learn from the Indigenous wisdom that is offered on our programs and to create a foundation of personal responsibility with learners for the careful stewardship of the environment.

Program Summary

This unique program brought the professional development expertise of **Inside Education** and the Indigenous network of **The HOWL Experience** to support teachers in bringing meaningful land-based learning experiences to their students.

25 educators from across Alberta joined together to share best practices for teaching and learning outdoors. We are proud to share the impact that this program had on these teachers, and how they will use their experience to enhance forest education.

The program was designed to offer insights and networks to enhance the integration of land-based learning and connectionst to Indigenous Ways of Knowing in classroom teaching and learning. We also highlighted how outdoor spaces can create opportunities to connect with key environmental topics including water, air and wildlife while building healthy relationships to the land and indigenous peoples.
