Introduction

Inside Education, alongside Forestry Futures Alliance partners Work Wild and CAREERS, is proud to report on the 2024 Forestry for B.Ed Students and Beginning Teachers Professional Development Program. This program was developed with the intention of introducing pre-service and beginning teachers to the diversity of careers and opportunities in Alberta's forest sector through hands-on experiences with experts working and living in Alberta's forests, and provide them with knowledge and resources to bring forest education back to their classrooms.

24 participants attended from six different post secondary institutions and five different school districts across the province, including 6 beginning teachers and 18 pre-service teachers working towards their Bachelor of Education.

This program was planned with this specific audience in mind, with the hopes of equipping them with skills, knowledge and experience to bring forestry and forest education to their classrooms from the very start of their teaching careers!





Program Highlights and Participants

The Forestry in Alberta PD began in Edmonton and travelled to Hinton, giving participants a first-hand experience of the careers, opportunities, and innovation in Alberta's forestry industry.

Program highlights include a behind-the-scenes tour of entomology, dendrochronology, and pathology labs at the Northern Forestry Center, a tour of Hinton Wood Products Lumber Mill, conversations with Wildlife Biologists and a Forester from fRI Research, and participating in a stream sampling demonstration with the Athabasca Watershed Council. Participants took part in two forest education sessions, where they explored hands-on examples of forest education and brainstormed ways to bring what they learned during the program into the classroom. Overall, it was a jam-packed schedule that incorporated a wide variety of perspectives on the importance of forests and forestry.

Teacher Feedback


Inside Education received overwhelmingly positive feedback from this program, with 100% of surveyed teachers indicating that the Forestry In Alberta PD program was a high-value, high-quality, and inspiring educational opportunity and that they would recommend Inside Education programs to a colleague.

100%

of survey respondents indicated that they feel more equipped with personal knowledge, learning materials, and supports to bring meaningful forest and forestry education to their students.

Between the pre-program and post-program surveys, participants indicated **up to a 133%** increase in knowledge on topics related to **forests** and **forestry**, including processes related to **forest management** and **forest harvesting**, **careers** related to the forestry industry, and **Indigenous connections** to the boreal ecoregion. Teachers felt their understanding of forest technologies and innovations increased the most as a result of this trip.

Participants rated their level of understanding on the following major themes
