Introduction

Inside Education is pleased to report on a second successful year of our Women in Outdoor Careers program, a series of educational events designed to connect female and non-binary students with professionals in a variety of environmental and natural resource sectors including agriculture, forestry, reclamation, monitoring, conservation and stewardship!

Two Women in Outdoor Careers events were held in October 2024 - one at Jumpingpound Demonstration Forest in Kananaskis, and the second at the Boreal Wetland Centre at Evergreen Park, outside of Grande Prairie.

Expert guests were invited to speak about their career paths including how they got started in their career. Each guest brought an activity, demonstration, or equipment to demonstrate a day-in-the life on the job. This year's program saw **18** expert guests interact with **133** students from **6** schools.

Jumpingpound Demonstration Forest

The Calgary-area Women in Outdoor Careers program was held at Jumpingpound Demonstration Forest in Kananaskis. In attendance was over **110** grade 8-11 students from:

- Senator Patrick Burns School
- Alice Jamieson Academy at Stanley Jones School

Experts from various outdoor and natural resource sectors were invited to speak about their careers and bring a hands-on experience that helps to demonstrate a day-in-the-life! This included a reclamation and soil testing demonstration with Canadian Natural, a pasture grazing assessment with the Foothills Forage and Grazing Association, a tree planting exercise with West Fraser, and demonstration of a Wolman Pebble Count with BGC Engineering.

The day ended with a networking session that encouraged connecting with other students and sharing their experiences from the day.

Boreal Wetland Centre

The Grande Prairie Women in Outdoor Careers program at the Boreal Wetland Centre welcomed **22** grade 8-12 students from **St. John Paul II** and **Hillcrest Christian School**

Stations included demonstrations from Ducks Unlimited on how to use a soil auger, plant identification with WorkWild, and Canadian Natural showcased some equipment that they use out in the field.

Students had the opportunity to visit all 7 stations in small groups and had personal interactions with speakers to ask more questions and have in depth conversations. During the debrief, there was a moving and impactful discussion in which speakers shared advice they would give their past self about their career.


Students, speakers, and teachers left the program feeling empowered and supported by other strong, generous and resilient women and non binary people.
